SIOUX FALLS, Oct. 16. (P)— Thirty state and county officers raided five West Twelfth Street night clubs and a beer parlor here last night. Operators and employes were placed under arrest after, State's Attorney Jerry Maher said, the places were stripped of gambling equipment and liquor.

No charges had been filed this afternoon. Maher said the arrests were made on warrants and an affidavit. Nine club operators posted bonds of \$1,000 each and two employes posted \$250 each. Other employes were released, subject to call for questioning at Maher's office.

The state's attorney said he expected to take the case into Sioux Falls municipal court at 9 c'clock Friday morning.

Slot machines, crap tables, dice, poker chips and dice game paraphernalia were seized, Maher said. The raids were made simultaneously at 11 p.m. and last of the bond money was paid to County Jailer Jess Baker at 3 a.m.
