Definitely not the well known Las Vegas casino operator Wilbur Clark (not even a close relative <g> ).

William "Bill" Harold Clark, born 1911 at an Army post in Rhode Island, moved to the LA area when a young man. The chips were delivered to 1631 Alamitos in 1940 which at the time was the location of a café recently opened by Clark called the "Alamo." He operated the Alamo Cafe

at the location for over 20 years, adding a billiard parlor next door in the 1950's. He changed the name to the Cozy Cafe in the early 1960's and was gone by the mid-1960's.
